HAY FESTIVAL MALDIVES 2010

"Three years ago, this Festival would have been banned by the dictatorship, and up until today, the public have never been allowed on this, the Presidential Retreat Island of Aarah..."

THESE WERE THE WORDS OF A FORMER POLITICAL PRISONER who visited the inaugural Hay Festival Maldives which ran from 14 to 17 October 2010. With a very recent past of political and cultural suppression and facing an uncertain future on the frontline of climate change, the Maldives proved to be a unique place to bring together a collection of local and international speakers to debate cultural heritage, language, writing and the environment.

The festival launched with a free musical evening on the capital island, Male, with four local bands playing to an audience of several thousand on Thursday 14 October.



The events then moved to Aarah, the Presidential Retreat Island, and a whole series of debates, discussions, films and music were held in three venues on Friday 15 and Saturday 16 October, including Abdulla Sodiq and Habeeba Hussain Habeeb on Maldivian Folklore, Peter Godwin resonating with his stories of Mugabe, a celebration of traditional sung poetry, Raiveru, and Jung Chang with her experiences of growing up in a cultural revolution.

There was a strong climate change theme with the Environment Minister Mohamed Aslam announcing the Maldives' application to UNESCO for the designation of the entire Baa Atoll as a protected biosphere reserve. Mark Lynas, the President's Climate Change Advisor, talked about the challenges of the 10-year carbon neutral plan; Tim Smit about the Eden Project's involvement in the Maldives; and Ian McEwan discussed his award-winning novel Solar. To close

the day, Paris-based Maldivian DJ Ravin whipped up a storm on Saturday evening to a sell-out audience.

JUNG CHANG

On Sunday 17 October a series of workshops was held, mainly in schools on Male, to bring students into contact with authors. Ian McEwan talked to a school group about his early work and starting out as a writer, and Monty Don ran a workshop on the island of Soneva Gili in their organic garden with 15 school children from Male.

Hay Festival Maldives represented the first time an event of its kind had ever been held in the Maldives. The Festival as a whole achieved a sell-out audience, and involved a very strong youth element.
